Auchterhouse Sports Day - Saturday 29th August

Preparations for this year's sports day are now well underway and tickets for the evening ceilidh will be on sale from the contacts below from 18th August onwards.

The day will kick off at 1pm with the Auchterhouse Pipe Band, followed by the pantomime horse race on the playing fields. There will be all the usual obstacles that you would find in a grand national (with an Auchterhouse twist) so we hope that your horses have been in training all summer. Please remember that there will be water obstacles so you may wish to bring a change of shoes for the pantomime horse race.

The horse event will be followed by the Hill Race at 3pm (£3 entry fee) and the presentation of prizes at around 4.30pm. Other events will run throughout the day, including the hexathlon, archery and display of the competition entries for the vegetable carving, chutney and cupcake competitions. Teas and coffees will be available throughout the afternoon with the tent opening at 1.30pm.

Donations of sandwiches and baking for the tea and coffee stall would be greatly appreciated on the morning of the event.

Entries for the chutney, cupcake and vegetable carving competitions should be brought along on the day. The theme for cupcakes and vegetable carving is "celebrities". Please see below for rules.

The day's festivities will then spill over into the evening ceilidh, starting at 8pm, with doors open from 7.30pm. The price of your ticket (£10 per adult & £2 per school age child) includes a burger from the BBQ which will be open until 9pm. A "Bring Your Own" policy exists whereby you can bring your own drinks and snacks along with you.

Community Council Update - May to July



Police matters

Unfortunately no police officer has been able to attend our last 5 meetings to give a report on incidents in our area. It is hoped that we will have their presence at future meetings. There have been some attempted break-ins to outbuildings, so make sure your property is kept secure and report anything suspicious to Police Scotland on 101.



Road and traffic matters

On The Brae and Dronley Road, especially through Eastfield Farm, vehicle speeds are too great and causing concern. The police are monitoring the situation. A collection service for pupils in outlying areas to bring them safely into the village (and return home) has been started – a bus stop has been painted on the road in front of the hall for this.



Community Council Election

This will be held in October and will be followed by a 3 year term of office (until October 2018). Nomination papers of candidates seeking election must be submitted to Angus Council by 4pm on 28 September. Existing Community Councillors term of office will end on 5 October, then:

- If there are not more than 8 nominations (the number of vacancies) letter confirming their election will be sent to candidates on 9 October.
- If there are more than 8 nominations a Poll will be held on 26 October with the results declared on 2 November.

The first meeting of the new council will be on 15 October (the date of the AGM) or 19 November (after a Poll). Junior members (16 and under) can be co-opted at this meeting.

Village Hall

The Hall Committee has been informed by Angus Council, the owners of the Hall, that major repairs will be made to the Hall to improve its energy efficiency. The walls will be stripped back and new insulated plaster-boarding installed plus new electric panel heaters fitted. We are also hopeful that as part of the improvements, the ceiling will be lowered to just above the windows which will have a significant impact on reducing heating costs. Work is due to start in the late autumn, depending on contractors. There is no doubt this will cause considerable upheaval to the on-going usage of the Hall for a couple of months.



Alternative meeting places are being considered, but until a definite date is given for work starting, nothing can be announced as yet. We will keep the members of the Hall Committee informed. The members of the Hall Committee are the representatives appointed by the users of the Hall. If any organisation or group who use the Hall have any concerns about whether they are represented then please let us know.

The Village Hall 200 Club resumes in August. This is a most valuable source of funding for the Hall while also benefiting the ticket holders. There are still a few numbers available at £5 each. At each draw, prizes range from £10 to £5 with a grand first prize of £60 at the summer draw. We are very grateful to John and Mary Skea for all their work in maintaining this important fund raiser and to Andrew, their son, who oversees the paperwork.

AUCHTERHOUSE WEATHER - January to June 2015

The year started off with a windy January. There were two days when the wind speed reached 79 mph, one on the 9th from WNW and one from SW on the 15th. On the 14th 12 cms of snow fell, but it did not last. Quite a sunny month for January. February was just a little warmer than average and was quite a dry month with only 2cms of snow on the 23rd. Again the sunshine was well above average. Quite a lot of wind with 79mph recorded on the 1st.

March was again sunnier than normal, with approximately normal rainfall. Mean temperature slightly above average. But April is the outstanding month with 240.5 hours of sunshine, not only is this by far the highest April total at Auchterhouse, but it is the highest monthly total of all the years for which I have records! Surprising that this occurred during April, as the longer daylight hours of May, June and July would seem to be when this would be expected. April was short of rainfall (56% of normal) and mean temp nearly 1°C above average.

Maximum temperature of 21.2°C occurred on the 23rd.

May was a slightly disappointing month with roughly average sunshine (167.7 hours) and rainfall nearly double the normal at 101.8mms. Quite a windy month. The temperature never reached 20°C during May and the mean was roughly 1 degree below average. June turned out to be a reasonably dry month with 148 hours of sunshine (a little above average).

There were two days (10th and 11th) when the daily sunshine exceeded 16 hours. I think these are both daily records for this site and there was "wall to wall sunshine" virtually all day on these two days. Highest temperature reached was 22.3°C on the 10th and there were 3 other days when the temperature equalled or exceeded 20°.

As I write this, during a rather wet and miserable July, we wait in vain for the weather to start coming up here from the south, instead of persistent cold air down from the Arctic.

DRONLEY MOOR & WOOD – PART 3

GRANDFATHER SAVES THE WOOD

The entire wood was to be felled, working from the Templeton end, but Grandfather persuaded the authorities (Uncle Bruce thought via the Factor of Glamis, a Mr Murray) to spare the block of Scots Pine to the north of the house. Dronley House, right on the top of the hill, was very exposed - Grandpa would complain that his chrysanthemums were blown right out of the ground - so he was very keen to keep these trees. They also formed the nucleus for the replanting of the forest and we are all greatly indebted to him today for this, as these older Scots Pines now form one of the grandest stands in the wood.

TREE MUNCHER

The 'tree-muncher' became a great family excitement in 2000. I was alarmed late one night by engine noises and flickering lights in the middle of the forest so set off with my daughter to investigate... We found an astonishing, rather intimidating machine roaring in the dark and 'munching' trees by its own floodlights, surrounded by a cloud of illuminated insects. It turned out that this was the Forestry Commission's first hydraulic tree-harvesting machine, and only on site for a few days, hence it was working



through the night. It could grip a whole coniferous tree, slice it off at the ground, strip the branches, cut the trunk into lengths and then neatly stack the logs! The operator was very proud of it and the children and nephews were thrilled to get a demonstration the next day, when we also asked it to tidy-up one very noticeable leaning tree in the midst of the tall scots pines. The leaning tree had annoyed me for years but no sooner was it 'tidied' than a gale blew several more to 'untidy' angles. I gave up!

WIND DAMAGE

My own favourite tree was the scots pine at the SW corner of this stand (by the new road-gate) which had a gloriously picturesque limb which I several times saved from amputation by the Hydro-Electric linesmen clearing back trees from the wires.

The tree with its limb made a dramatic silhouette against the setting sun, but the entire tree fell victim the terrible gales of 2013-14. His roots had, some years earlier, been damaged by thoughtless ramblers who had lit a fire in the crook of his roots.

It had been a very dry summer, the fire spread deep underground and, when my garden hose failed to put it out, I called the Fire Brigade. Now that the tree has fallen, his roots on that side of the 'plate' appear to show the damage which will surely have contributed to the tree's downfall.

LOCAL ASSET

Dronley Wood is now a wonderful local asset, both for humans and for a huge range of wild creatures, and I am extremely proud of the part my Grandfather played in its survival.

These few notes are based on family memory and I would love to hear from anyone who may have more to add. My particular pride, however, remains that Grandfather saved the Scots Pines which now form such a grand local amenity.
