Community Council Update - November to February



CPR Training

Helen Bradey is offering sessions again for CPR training. We will give priority to the people who missed out on the last cancelled session due to Covid starting. Sidlaw Path Network/Local Path Access

A route between the village & Strathmore is being considered and a representative from Angus Council will come to a meeting to consult the public. The core path behind Scotston Farm has been badly damaged due to heavy machinery conducting planned tree felling. The contractor who is working in the forestry block has agreed to put the path back to its original state after the works are completed. The local walks leaflet has not moved forward as awaiting comments from some land owners. Most of these paths are existing and it is hoped they will become part of the Sidlaw Path Network.



Storm Arwen

In the event of a storm where we lose electricity and water we need to create a neighbourly network so we can help each other out. We could set up a resilience committee with volunteers to form a plan for when incidents happen. They would work with a volunteer/point of contact for each street/area to report to issues or get people help.

Community Council Update - November to February



Planning (status at the time of CC meeting minutes being published) New

- 1/00782/FULL and 21/00783/LBC (listed building consent) are for alterations to Kirkton House which is Grade C listed, built in the early 19th century.
- 21/00750/FULL (Sunnyhall Mill, Lundie) is a proposal to demolish an old stone barn and to build a house using the original stone as much as possible.
- 21/00851/FULL a double storey extension to Newton of Auchterhouse Farm DD2 5PB. This involves significant alterations to the existing roof and checks for bat roosts have found no problem.


Approved

- 21/00335/FULL the viewing shelter and pond at Thriepley House by the Round Loch at Lundie (a designated SSSI) has now been approved (with consent from SNH)
- 20/00805/FULL to build a summerhouse and path beside the Round Loch at Lundie has been approved at last with conditions which reflect the importance of conserving the loch's SSSI status.
- 21/00782/FULL and 21/00783/LBC to make alterations at Kirkton House, which has category C listing, has been approved with conditions which reflect the house's listed status.

- 20/00805/FULL a timber summerhouse beside the Round Loch at Lundie
- 21/00750/FULL The application to convert and extend the old mill at Sunnyhall to create a house is still being considered.

Many volunteers joined in the big planting effort in the last 3 months of 2021 to safely get about 2,500 oak 1,600 hazel and 250 lime into the cleared areas for them on the north side of the wood. Many thanks are due to every one of them for their efforts on most Wednesdays and Saturdays. Some hazel have gone into the earth bank at the east side of the car park. All the oak remaining in our nursery (about 350 trees) have been earmarked for areas among the pine trees which been cleared of trees by Dirk and Andrew.

Extensive clearing of poor and windblown trees has been carried in many areas by Dirk and Andrew - recently assisted by Martin Kemp. Stacks of logs beside the forest road have been built up ready for sale.

The late November storm created havoc with both our shelter and the tool store (horse box) in the nursery taking direct hits from fallen trees, of which well over 300 fell. Most of the paths had to be closed because of fallen or hanging trees but these have all been cleared by the before mentioned during the last $2\frac{1}{2}$ months. In the next 2 months a contractor will come in to clear and remove the large area of pine (near the forest road) flattened by Arwen.

Dirk has applied for funding to pay for the time spent by our chainsaw experts and hopefully Aviva Community funding will help us. Their funding is linked to Crowdfunding and will be publicised very soon, so look out for details and please give generously.

AUCHTERHOUSE WEATHER 2021

The year started with a frosty January, there being frost on 27 days. There was a little snow during January, but very little compared with February, when much snow fell, being 30 cms deep on the 10th and 11th of the month. February was a dull month, and total precipitation was 187.2mms, way above the average of 57.6mms for that month. Temperature during January was way below average, but more normal for February.

March was relatively snowless, the temperature being 6.07°C, which is higher than the average of 4.8°C for that month. It was relatively dry with 43.7mms of rain compared with the average of 65.4mms. April's mean temperature was 5.03° which was considerably less than March's figure. There were 19 days with air frosts. However the sunshine hours for the month were 218.9 hours almost a record for that month. Rainfall was very low at 14.8mms.

May was very wet with 170.8mms, almost a record for May. It was also particularly dull, which really showed up as May is often the sunniest month. June was dry but not particularly sunny and the temperature managed to reach 23.3°C on the 23rd.

I acknowledge again the help received when the anemometer stopped by tree surgeon Duncan Sanger and Garry Stewart. As it happened, the problem was eventually traced to a cable which was tripped over by a roe-deer in our garden. However the cabling on the mast is now much better and should last...

July was a pleasant month with with 153.9 hours of sunshine and mean temperature of 15.5°C although there were 78.8mms of rain, against an average of 91.6mms. There was mist/fog on no less than 8 days which is unusual for July. Warmest day of the year turned out to be on the 17th of that month. The weather during August was nothing special and quite a lot of rain at the wrong times may have contributed to preventing Auchterhouse Sports from taking place. August was not particularly sunny and rainfall was 85.3mms, which is less than the August average of 99.3mms.

September's sunshine was almost the same as August's which is surprising given the fact that the days are a lot shorter at that time. Rainfall was closest to average at 61.5mms. October had no less than 10 sunless days with a total of 66.2 hours, making it a rather dull month with 139.9mms of rain, way above average of 97mms.

November was a very dry month with only 40.7mms of rain. It was notable for some very high wind gusts caused by hurricane Arwen on 26th November when I recorded 72mph. Our power went of shortly after that so there may have been higher gusts. We were without power for about 48 hours (as were many Auchterhouse residents). We were glad to have a propane heater which kept us from getting too cold as the temperature was pretty low during that period being just above freezing point.

December 2021 was a very dull month with no fewer than 16 dull days. Mean temperature was 3.2°C, close to the average for that month of 2.6°C. Only 45.2 hours of sunshine were recorded and 94.9mms of rain, a little higher than the average for that month.













People often ask me if I can detect global warming in my figures. I also notice from the previous version of Auchterhouse Newsletter that Auchterhouse School had been discussing global warming.

I have been taking records of Auchterhouse weather since March 1996. My father also had some records taken in the period 1959 to 1967 and my brother has some records from 1967 to 1972 or thereabouts. It would have been better if the records went back further. My father's house was Waterston's at the top of the Brae, which is arguably quite a bit colder than my house near the war memorial.

I have calculated the average temperatures at my father's house and my brother's allowing for the different altitudes for the years 1959 to 1973 and the calculated average temperature was 7.32°C. For the years 2006 to 2021 at my location the figure is 8.05°C, an increase of 0.73°C. This is quite a lot lower than the 1.5° quoted by environmentalists but they are talking about the increase since the industrial revolution, a much longer time. Also individual locations are subject to unusual events; for the year 2010 we had at Auchterhouse a very cold November to December and that made the mean temperature for the year 6.61° which is much lower than the long term average of 8.05°C.

Look Down

We've been having a very mild winter so far and with snowdrops and aconites flowering, Spring is nearly here. However I want to look back to last summer when I was lucky to have a lovely walk along Funny Neuk and up Greenford Hill last July with a couple of experts in wild flowers. Funny Neuk, a lovely name, is the track at the bottom of Greenford Hill which runs parallel to Braeside and carries on right through to Balluderon.

The first section of the path has an amazing array of wild flowers and butterflies. There are the usual ones like Yarrow (white), Scabious (pale lilac) and Ragwort (yellow) all about 30cms tall. Low down were yellowy orange bird's foot trefoil, yellow tormentil, the tiny blue flowered Speedwell and the very delicate Eyebright. Well worth crouching down to look at the daintiest wee white flowers. A bit further on was a bright orange flower called fox and cubs. I wonder who named that! The best sighting was of several Common Spotted Orchids – lovely purple spikes. How can these beautiful plants be called "common"! Among the thistles were tortoiseshell butterflies and lots of 5 and 6 spot Burnet day flying moths, bright red spots on a black body.

Further up the hill among the heather was the dull white Sneezewort. Like Yarrow, they both belong to the Achillea family, now propagated into bright colours of a popular garden plant. We spied the occasional Harebell, with its delicate blue bells.



Look Down (continuted)

Over the top of the hill on to the plateau area is the Site of Special Scientific Interest or a SSSI, where we spotted growing among the heather, cowberries, crowberries, blueberries and occasional cranberries, unusual in Angus. The SSSI is designated as a subalpine dry heath (also known as upland dwarf shrub heath) and is one of the largest and least disturbed upland heaths in Angus away from the Highland area. The heather is becoming rank and is smothering other plants but we did spy the two leaves of Twayblade. On the way back we spotted a solitary Wintergreen flower, quite a rare plant.

Coming down the track past the old water house (it used to supply the water to the village), we saw a huge number of small pearl bordered fritillary butterflies as well as meadow brown, ringlet and the occasional dainty small blue butterfly.

Altogether a fascinating couple of hours which will hopefully encourage you to look up to see the birds (see the summer edition of the Newsletter) and down to see the myriad flowers (far more than I have named here) and butterflies as you walk over the hill.


