Auchterhouse Community Council Chair's ReportOctober 2023

Auchterhouse Community Council (ACC) has started another 4 year term following our election in October 2022. As we had 8 applicants for the 8 places we did not have an actual election. The new team is as follows:

Shiona Baird (Chair), Mike Cowdery (Secretary), Mark Pearce (Treasurer), Linda Cockram (Planning Contact), Helen Smith, Alasdair Macleod, John Forster and Euan Baird. Darren Law was co-opted specifically for his planning knowledge.

We have been busy throughout the year with some visible examples of our work, namely the seat in Dronley Wood as a lasting tribute to Garry Stewart. This was made by our local joiner Martyn Kemp who fittingly used larch wood from Dronley Community Woodland to create the bench. A very welcome newcomer to the Auchterhouse community Johnny Sneddon, has already left a wonderful legacy in the design and construction of the circular seat round the beech tree in the Park. This is a unique, impressive addition to our Park which we hope will be treated with the respect it deserves.

There have been ongoing issues to deal with such as the rather haphazard placing of books in the

telephone box. Anything left on the concrete floor just gets damp and has to be thrown out. The defibrillator has had books placed too close to it to allow it to be grabbed quickly in an emergency. We are planning to have a frame placed round it to protect it. The defibrillator was taken to an incident in the village but fortunately was not needed. As we have had it for 5 years now, the pads and batteries were renewed as advised. CPR classes are being planned again so keep a look out for more information in the future.

Notice boards are another recurring issue. A notice board in the Park was deemed a better position than in the Hall garden. A decision on the most appropriate one will be made soon.

The most important current issue is the planned removal of the bus service to the village. This is a lifeline to a few people in Auchterhouse and the surrounding countryside but Angus Council deems it too expensive to continue on its present timetable with the limited usage. We have strenuously opposed this proposal and are waiting for a decision in the next week or two. If nothing else, a form of dial a ride would be acceptable. We will maintain a watching eye on the outcome.

Our community website, auchterhouse.com has recently been updated and is full of interesting facts and details of community activities. Warm thanks go to Aileen Baird who maintains the website and the Newsletter, though after doing this for more than 10 years she would welcome the chance to pass the work on to another helpful volunteer.

Our plans for the future include gates beside the toilets for the Park to allow parents to give their toddlers more freedom without fear of them running out onto the road. We are also going to start looking at new equipment for the Park, especially for younger children. At the road end, there are plans to install secure bike racks within the old bus shelter.

Our thanks go to the three young men who do a great job in keeping the toilets clean. We have passed on the praise we get for maintaining such a useful facility.

The Council gives us an annual grant for which we are very grateful.

Thanks to all the hardworking members of the Community Council who all make my job as Chair so much easier. Special thanks to Linda Cockram for all the time and attention she gives to planning applications, our Secretary Mike Cowdery who is the contact for all the everyday work of the Community Council and Mark Pearce, our Treasurer, who is so helpful, often going beyond his official remit. Thanks to you all.

Thanks also to the Angus Councillors Beth Whiteside and Heather Doran who attend our meetings regularly. We have been very pleased to welcome Police Con. Martyn Brennan. He is one of the team of local Community Police Officers who has attended our meetings. Their attendance reinforces the value and importance of continuing to maintain a Community Council in Auchterhouse since its inaugural meeting in 1977!

BUS SERVICE

WORK AT THE PARK

The notice board for the park has been purchased. However it will need a frame to attach it to the fence at the recycling centre. It is hoped that this will be done soon so that we can start using the notice board for items such as the new bus timetable. The plan for the gates and fence for the park has been made but will require a bit of muscle to put in the strainer posts. Any offers please contact me shionabaird@hotmail.co.uk. The period product display container which Angus Council supply is not suitable for our toilets so we plan to purchase a wall mounted one; just have to choose which one. Once these jobs have been completed we will start to look at new play equipment and resurfacing the tennis court. Any ideas on either would be very welcome.

PLANNING UPDATE

Eleven new planning applications were scrutinised but none needed comment. We are following up the issue of how trees on potential building land can be better protected, with Forestry and Land Scotland and Angus Council, now that "The Whins" site application is concluded. We also contacted FLS to object to the proposed car parking charges at Balkello Wood on behalf of local users. A major development proposal for around 300 houses at Muirhead is being kept under scrutiny, mainly because of possible knock-on effects of increased traffic for Auchterhouse.

The next meeting of the Community Council will be held on **December 21st 2023 at 7pm** in the Hall to which all are welcome. Mince pies might be provided if someone remembers!

The last few months have been exciting at Dronley Community Woodland. We have some brilliant news and also some challenges.

Storm Babet

As you will have seen, we had some storm damage at Dronley Wood. The storm Babet hit Dronley Wood on the 21st and 22nd of October and caused severe damage in the same area that had been affected by Storm Arwen in 2021.

In 2021, storm Arwen damaged 1 ha of Dronley Wood. Unfortunately, that area has extended to almost 2 ha. The tree species most affected is Scots Pine (again). The Scots Pine in that stand has grown very well but isn't well-adapted to the site conditions. Scots Pine should be planted on dry soil like sand to encourage the Pine to develop a deep root system. The dry soil encourages the tree to grow a deep root system (about 1 m deep). The Scots Pine at Dronley Wood was planted in 1960 on soil with good water availability. Because of that, our Scots Pine at Dronley Wood has developed a very shallow root system. The storm damage we have now is a direct consequence of the tree species choice in 1960 and the lack of thinnings. That highlights how important it is to plant well-site adapted tree species.

It's also essential to support the growth and development of the best quality trees (= frame trees) by regular thinnings. The frame trees would have more space to grow after the thinning and start to develop a larger crown. The frame trees would also develop a much bigger root system increasing the stability. The thinnings, aiming at increasing timber quality and the stability of the Scots Pine, would have needed to be carried out 40 years ago. Today, we need to stabilize the stands by socalled transformation thinnings. We also need to regenerate the stands by natural regeneration and under-planting.

Other areas of Dronley Wood are also affected by the storm damage. Several small clusters of windblown trees and individual windblown trees block access to many parts of the wood.

Many of our woodland paths are closed to the public for safety reasons (by barrier tape and signs). The all-ability path leading up to the shelter remains open (at the point of writing).

We ask everyone visiting Dronley Wood to use the all-abilities path leading up to the shelter (at the moment). Please stick to the all-abilities path and don't enter any paths affected by windblow. The leaning trees are dangerous and could fall at any moment without warning.

We are working very hard to fell and extract the leaning trees. My colleagues Andrew and Marty have made tremendous progress. Felling and extracting windblown trees is incredibly dangerous since the timber is often under tension. Please stay well clear of chainsaw work, extraction and forest machinery. I would also like to ask our woodland visitors to ensure dogs don't enter the work area. That will help us work safely and efficiently on re-opening some affected paths.

We might be able to open some parts of Dronley Wood soon. Please check our Facebook Page for updates. Please take care when visiting Dronley Wood and avoid walks on windy days.

It is sad to see the storm damage at Dronley Wood. Unfortunately, the same area has been affected again. After storm damage, the remaining trees will need about 5 years (minimum) to get used to the windier conditions. The remaining trees left after a storm stabilise themselves by developing a larger crown and root system.



Our trees at Dronley Wood only had 2 years in between storms with gusts exceeding 70 mph. That is not enough time for the trees to stabilise. We aim to regenerate the site by natural regeneration to develop Dronley Wood into a site-adapted, mixed woodland.

Ironically, I have just been on holiday to Germany and Switzerland. We visited a woodland that had been very badly affected by Storm Lothar in 1999. The wind speeds of Storm Lothar exceeded 100 mph and devastated large woodland areas. The storm damage in the woodlands was of an unimaginable scale. The wood I visited during my holiday was severely affected and has recovered very well. The windblown areas have developed into beautiful, site-adapted, mixed stands. The stands damaged by storm Lothar (in the woodland I visited) were reforested by a mixture of natural regeneration and Oak cluster planting. We will also develop the stand devastated by storm Babet into a beautiful mixed woodland.

AVIVA Community Fund

As many of you will know, Dronley Community Woodland did run an AVIVA Community Fund Crowdfunding Project between October and the beginning of November. Our project is called "Natural Regeneration at Dronley Community Woodland". Norman Sutherland and Sandra Ewing supported our fundraising project enormously with photos, filming and drone video footage. We aimed to raise £ 15000 to help us develop Dronley Wood into a permanent, irregular mixed woodland.

Permanent, irregular woodlands are very different from even-aged woodlands. In a permanent, irregular woodland, all age groups and tree sizes of several tree species (depending on the site) are present within one stand. All development stages of a woodland are present within a small area.



Permanent Irregular woodlands (called "Plenter Forests") are continuous forests where regeneration occurs naturally and constantly. Permanent Irregular woodlands are much more resistant to storm damage compared to even-aged stands. Storm Babet has highlighted the importance of regenerating and developing Dronley Wood towards a permanent irregular mixed woodland consisting of numerous intermediate trees and several magnificent mature trees surrounded by plentiful natural regeneration.

The AVIVA Community Fund fundraising for our project "Natural Regeneration at Dronley Community Woodland" finished very successfully on the 7th of November 2023. The funding support has been fantastic.

I would like to thank you for supporting our project 'Natural Regeneration at Dronley Community Woodland' on the AVIVA Community Fund project page. Thanks to your support, we have raised £15,513 (+ est. £797.50 from gift aid) with donations from 60 supporters matched by The Save Our Wild Isles Community Fund and BA Better World Community Fund.

Your funding support will help us secure the long-term future of Dronley Community Woodland. We are very thankful for your support and look forward to starting work on our project of establishing Natural Regeneration at Dronley Woods.

Improving the Woodland Infrastructure at Dronley Wood We had also applied to the Angus Green Space Fund for the Angus Place Prosperity Programme for a project called: "Improving the Woodland Infrastructure at Dronley Community Woodland". The woodland infrastructure, consisting of forest roads and (permanent) racks, is essential for implementing Continuous Cover Forestry.



Repairing and restoring our woodland infrastructure will enable us to implement ecological woodland management. One of our woodland management priorities is to protect the woodland soil for future generations. Using a system of permanent racks is essential for avoiding unnecessary soil compaction.

Improving the woodland infrastructure will ensure the ecological and economic long-term sustainability of Dronley Wood. The woodland infrastructure allows us to protect forest health, public access, recreation and safety of woodland visitors.

Our funding application has been successful. That is brilliant. Improving the woodland infrastructure at Dronley Wood is a very sustainable long-term investment. GPS surveying and GIS mapping will record the permanent woodland infrastructure for future generations.

Our project: "Improving the Woodland Infrastructure at Dronley Community Woodland" has received \pounds 15000 from the UK Government through the Angus Place Prosperity Programme. The source of this funding is the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF).

The funding is a sustainable long-term investment, allowing us and future generations to manage Dronley Community Woodland using Continuous Cover Forestry Principles.

Firewood

We started to sell processed firewood from Dronley Wood. Most of the timber was felled last year and has seasoned very well.

We offer 1.60 m3 for £ 200 (including Delivery).

We manage Dronley Wood according to the Continuous Cover Forestry principle. All the timber we sell is felled and extracted using low-impact woodland management measures. Buying firewood from Dronley Community Woodland will help us to develop Dronley Wood towards a diverse, stable, resilient, multi-aged, multi-layered mixed woodland for the benefit of future generations.

We will start organizing volunteer days from December onwards. We have a lot of work at Dronley Wood like tree planting, transplanting seedlings, direct seeding and some fencing. We are looking forward to our volunteer days and will advertise them on our Facebook Page.

That's a lot of good news (apart from the storm damage). The funded project and the income from selling the firewood will help us to develop Dronley Wood towards a permanent, irregular, diverse, mixed woodland for the benefit of future generations.

What a hard frost this morning (Nov 25th) but a beautiful sunny windless day, perfect for pottering outside. The main job at this time of year is leaf clearing so this morning we swept leaves off the grass and where they had collected in odd corners. There is a lot of work involved and with few if any in the community interested in eating the produce that decision could save us a lot of work. Both Elizabeth and I ain and I grow our own vegetables in our own gardens. The three growing plots are there if anyone wants to grow their own vegetables. Just get in touch.

That hot chocolate while watching a movie


Bright Christmas lights lingering around the house

Auchterhouse Village Hall

The Hall Management Committee meets quarterly so September was our last meeting. After the refurbishment of the storeroom we thought we would have little to do for a while. However getting the Hall painted and sorting the outside lighting were the action points for this meeting. Painting the Hall has been on the agenda for a while but thank goodness we hadn't done anything about it.

Storm Babet which came from the east caused a leak from the roof above the east facing window. It drips every time the rain comes from the east. The water has damaged the plasterboard around the window and has now gone mouldy. Angus Council is aware of the leak but it is a roofing job which no doubt will take time to sort, knowing how much damage there is elsewhere needing sorting. We will definitely have to paint the area after it is fixed.

Some of the internal lights had stopped working but it was discovered that the fuse had tripped so that was easily sorted. The question why was answered when we realised the light beside the entrance had stopped working and was found to be full of water, so had to be replaced. Our local electrician Iain Gardyne, came very promptly and got the job done that same day.

There are lights facing the car parks which are rarely put on as the switch is inside the store room. It was agreed to have a PIR sensor installed but that was expensive so Iain installed a simple time clock setting the lights to go on for the evenings only. Good lighting is important to prevent accidents. Finally the main door has been getting increasingly stiff till it jammed tight last week. Fortunately Martyn Kemp was available and was able to sort the door, no easy task as it had to be taken off and re-aligned. What a difference, it opens so easily now. A big thank you to both our local tradesmen. Good to have them in the community.

Hopefully there will be no more emergencies and the Hall can carry on providing a safe and warm space for all community activities.


Our next event will be our annual Burns Supper on the 19th of January which will be held in the village hall. An evening of great food, entertainment and company is promised.

The walk at Dronley woods is a circular walk that takes you right round the wood and you can take different routes to make it a bit shorter or longer. There are also places to have a rest and sit down.








Thank you to everyone who came along to our 2023 Sports day and took part in the hill race, competitions, races, spectating and BBQ & ceilidh.
